New form of butt

These are the new butts the Club is investigating. BCE targets make a square full size FITA target with a square two part centre. The overall size of the centre plug is 500mm x 500mm, this is then broken up into two parts with the inner plug being 250mm x 250mm which covers the gold area of a 122cm face, hence allowing you to replace just the gold area, or the red area depending on which is shot out first.

From Guy McCutchan Dear Paringa Archers,

How are you??? Looking back, it's been quite a while, hasn't it?! I'm currently sitting in my rented room in Edinburgh, looking out across the Meadows Park getting drenched in the Scottish 'Liquid Sunshine'.

Following leaving the Gold Coast, I arrived in Japan some seven-or-so hours later. Japan was a shock to the senses from start to finish. I arrived in Osaka and spent about a week there, exploring the city and the areas around. A return train trip to a place called Nara which is a good half hour journey was about \$2.00 return. Nara is famous for having the largest man-made wooden building in the world, the Daikakujin.

From Osaka I narrowly caught a ferry to Kyushu, the lower island. I arrived on the island at about

6:00am and was completely lost and sleep deprived and somehow ended up having breakfast and a city tour with a very strange old lady. I was able to catch up with Aya, my friend from Uni, for a night where we cooked, practiced Japanese/English and generally caught up. [Guy then visited Hiroshima.]

It was then onward to the Old Capital of Kyoto where I was settling into the hostel life and meeting many interesting people. This worked out really well in that we all knew about different places and things to do that others weren't aware of. One of the most interesting times was climbing a small mountain naturally inhabited by Macaque monkeys so they would be swinging around overhead as walked.

Being the Old Capital, Kyoto is renowned for its old ways. There are hundreds of temples and shrines that are spectacles in themselves as well as flawless gardens that create a welcome break from the concrete jungle. There was a small district called Gion which is known as the entertainment core of Kyoto, alive with neon lights and restaurants as well as clubs and bars of a more sordid nature. But beyond the red lights was a street that has been left untouched, lined with a rough cobbled stone road and rice paper windows. It was one of the streets of traditional tea houses, where the faint shuffle of the mysterious Geisha and Maiko could be heard as they made their way to appointments to entertain the wealthy.

From the serenity of Kyoto I was thrown headlong into the whirlwind of Tokyo. Within the city my favourite place was the cultural district of Harajuku, known for its carefree youth culture and zany fashions. It was a lot of fun. Outside the city, the highlight was seeing Mt Fuji. Not the tallest mountain by a long way, but it certainly had grand presence, almost sumo-esque.

I was up the next morning at 5:00am to get to the airport by train 9:00am flight as to allow for the 2hour check-in time. The train ran a little late and I arrived at the east wing of the airport just on time to check in. Unfortunately my check in was on the west wing- this is bad news if you're in one of the biggest international airports in the world. In a flurry of suitcases, long legs and anime toys I made it and checked in 35 minutes before take-off. Sleepy, exhausted and in complete disbelief I was actually allowed on the flight, I settled in for the 13 hours ahead as we set course for Beijing and then Heathrow. I hope you're all well, keeping warm and shooting well!
